The Truth Will Set You Free

Revisited (2001)

Jesus said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth and the truth will set you free." (John 8.32)

Set you free. I often think that most of us have spent a great part of our lives wanting to be set free from something, but perhaps our understanding of those words is making the process more difficult rather than easier.

We want freedom with a capital "F." We simply want some things gone and no longer existing in our lives. Not many of those things we wish gone would be good things in and of themselves. We desire our lives to have a foundation of goodness and of good things, so anything we see getting in the way of that foundation is, by definition, not good and should be set aside.

I am beginning this article from a home not far from the offices of Tot Heil des Volks in Amsterdam, where I was privileged to have the opportunity to speak at *Hope or Fear*, a conference on the topic of pedophilia. The language barrier was overcome with the help of an excellent interpreter.

I was told by the conference organizers that this was the first time someone with my background would be sharing so publicly on the topic and while I tried to seem calm, inside I was a little more than anxious.

My talk had been carefully written in short paragraphs weeks in advance. While it was clear and informative, as soon as I started to speak, I knew it was a talk 'on paper.' God provided moments, however, when I stopped following what was on the paper and shared something I had not written ahead of time. It was in *those* moments I was truly connecting with the audience.

Amsterdam is a liberal city in a liberal country, The Netherlands recently made assisted suicide legal and at the time of this writing approved same sex marriages. Pornography is legal, and the taxes from prostitution provide much of the income needed to run the city. In other words, anyone living in this country is free to marry someone of the same gender, purchase and possess pornography, pay for, and receive sexual gratification, and assist someone in ending life. The laws of the land say they are free to do all these things.

Most of the people at this Christian conference saw and understood what I believe is a lie behind this kind of freedom. Some already understood from personal experience the pain such liberal thinking produces and, as I looked into their faces, I couldn't help but see the frustration they felt living in a land of so many freedoms.

Jesus had said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples." I don't think it was any easier for the people in the time of Jesus to hold to his teaching than it is for us today. When pastors teach, they try to offer the best or most correct way to do something. They share mistakes people make as examples to avoid those mistakes, or they share them as a means to understand why they are wrong.

"If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples." As Christians, we know that there is a difference between the laws of the state and the laws of God. Jesus said, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's (Matthew 22:21)." Jesus never said to ignore Caesar.

Pedophiles who act out on their desires are not seen as any better in the Netherlands than they are in the United States of America. Prison and public disgrace are the cost of being arrested. Ironic, isn't it, that this society (or any society for that matter) offering so many freedoms should recoil over an adult-child relationship that becomes sexual. Could it be that at least in this, society sees the truth?

"Then you shall know the truth and the truth will set you free." What truth is that? Is it the truth that says pornography, prostitution, and homosexuality are freedoms, or is it the truth that says the purity of childhood must be protected? If a child's purity is not something of value, why arrest an adult who has a sexual relationship with a child? On its own, an arrest based merely on the age difference between the adult and the child is not an adequate reason for an arrest.

I believe the answer does lie in the purity of childhood as well as the right of all children not to be placed in behavioral situations they do not understand. In this, the state does have it right, and no organization or individual seeking to legitimize adult-child sexual relationships can alter that truth. Any such attempt to do so cannot be seen as a means of enlightening society, for the attempt is founded on the desire to serve personal needs at the expense of children.

I do believe the truth sets us free. Those of us who have offended against children must face the truth that our behavior did harm our victims. Truth can be and is a healthy boundary we can place around our lives so that relapse and the harming of another child will not occur.

Truth can open windows in the dark rooms of our childhood memories, those places where many of us keep our secrets. Dealing with the truth of having been abused as a child will cause incredible pain, but it is a pain which will lay open an infected wound that needs fresh air to heal.

If the future holds nothing but fear for you, ask God for eyes that will allow you to see your life from his perspective, not through the lens of the world's distorted vision. God's vision for us is one of hope, and that is the truth that will set you free.

2021 - Some thoughts

The truth can be a difficult thing. For some, it will bring about feelings of shame. For others, it will give birth to fear if the truth exposes a crime that has never come to light. And yet others find that sharing truth doesn't mean others will believe it.

My presentence investigation, for example, listed an act that never took place. When questioned why it was there, the answer was that all child molesters pretty much offend in the same way, so he decided I was only lying when I said I was innocent of what was written. I knew the truth, but I also knew the charge wouldn't be removed from his report.

I have gotten letters from individuals who challenge their presentence report and are told they would be denied access to the treatment program because of their denial. In some states, the decision to fight such a report might open the door to civil commitment. On the surface of things, the truth in some cases doesn't bring freedom.

Do not conform to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing, and perfect will. Romans 12:2 (NIV)

I know that I often fall short in my spiritual walk because most days I could have made better choices, been more charitable to others, and kept my thoughts more focused on God's presence. At the same time, fitting in with the way the world thinks and does things is no longer my goal. I have already been down some of the darker paths available to me and have no desire to repeat those choices.

God's love and mercy are with me daily; Jesus died for my sins so that I might have eternal joy; and the Holy Spirit reminds me minute by minute of the truth that does indeed set me free. I pray that the same truth will be yours.


The Wounded Healer
